Materials needed:

- Activity Presentation (Powerpoint)

Learning Target:

- 1) I can describe what a right is.
- 2) I can explain why play is important.
- 3) I can explain how I can use my voice to make a difference.

In this activity, children will have time to think of ways to help more children around the world engage in play. Children will work in groups to create an artifact, object, or other visual representation that describes their idea. Children will then share their ideas with their peers. The lesson concludes with a call to action and children thinking about the ways to use their voices and enact change.
